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Possible sources of funds to cover costs include:

- State and Federal agencies
- Donations and Contributions
- Grants
- Private-pay Tuition
- Endowment

This Exhibit lists the names and links of specific funding sources.

State and Federal agencies

To find your state Vocational Rehabilitation agency do a Google search on “vocational rehabilitation” for your state. Most community colleges have knowledge of a relationship with their state Voc Rehab agency.

The state employment department and Federal Department of Employment also are sources of funding, usually with specific grants.

Also check for a Workforce Investment Board¹ (also called Workforce Development Boards in some areas) or America Works² agency in your area.

Donations and Contributions

- Amazon Smile: people used to be able to set up their Amazon purchases, so a percentage of the payment goes to a designated non-profit. This program was ended in early 2023.
- Benevity Causes: Benevity.org, for a company's employees to contribute.
- eBay for charity: establish a charity profile page so can receive proceeds from a sale.
- Fundraise: fundraise.org, nonprofit fundraising software.
- Pledge: pledge.to, has a donate button app for Zoom.
- PayPal: vehicle for people to make donations.
- Trello: Trello.com, platform for tracking teams, to-dos, etc.
- WePay: wepay.com. vehicle by which donors can donate.

- Haas Foundation: www.haasfoundation.org supporter of UAP, gives scholarship and building grants. If you're a community college, this is a clear fundraising prospect.

- Local workforce development (or investment) boards.
- MEP National Network: Federally-funded network of nonprofit consultants to manufacturers. Find your local office and reach out: www.nist.gov/mep
- Mitsubishi Electric America Foundation: meus.com, made a significant grant to Uniquely Abled Project to develop resources for UAAs.
- National Tooling and Machining Association (NTMA): local chapters may have scholarships for students working towards manufacturing careers.

Recommended that UAAs establish relationships with their local chapters.
