### Siri's Story



Siri Reichelt is the Milwaukee Area Technical College UAA's first female participant. In an article by Mark Feldman, she shares how meaningful the program has been for her. Siri had tried college and a job, but she didn't feel accepted or supported until starting her training at MATC. Hesitant at first, she bonded with her teachers and soon felt a sense of belonging and accomplishment: "Being in a place where I'm truly accepted for who I am is a miracle... My mother has said this is the happiest she has ever seen me." Siri is now in her second semester and wants to be a role model for others. "Hopefully, another girl with autism sees what I have done and sees what I am doing and feels like she can come into the program."
